Committee Reports



SHERPAS' MEETING

Sherpas, the head representatives of each nation, kept visiting working groups all around, to ensure that each delegate from their nations were able to understand the workings of each working group and to propose viable solutions. Their job was to sort out conflicts, came in quite handy, and their critical thinking was lauded. The Sherpa track was quite heated, and deliberated upon several sub-agendas, citing solutions garnered from their counterparts in other working groups.

FINANCE TRACK



The delegates commenced the proceedings by giving their stance and views on the agenda. The following session comprised an informal debate marked by heated arguments that raised controversial and hypocritical statements. The intensity increased in the 3rd and 4th sessions as the crisis was introduced. This led to 2 hours of heated debate and deliberation, frequent arguments, fights between blocs, and the intervention of the sherpas. Eventually the crisis was resolved. The sessions comprised discussions on the sub-agendas, whose outcome was a unanimous consensus.



DIGITAL ECONOMY

The delegates commenced by discussing their positions on the newly introduced crisis on the new global cryptocurrency. Initial debates were marked by strong opinions, with many voicing concerns over the geopolitical pressures that had driven its rapid adoption. As the crisis deepened, conflicts emerged, particularly between Saudi Arabia, India, Russia, the USA, and Japan over the management of the International Crypto Bank (ICB). This led to intense debates, characterised by frequent arguments and strategic alliances, as Saudi Arabia pushed for Global South leadership, while others insisted on US control for five years. After several hours of continuous negotiations and sherpa interventions, a compromise was reached: management of the ICB would be region-specific. The remaining sessions were dedicated to discussing solutions to the crisis, including funding digital infrastructure, promoting digital literacy, and enhancing cybersecurity. These discussions, surprisingly, culminated in unanimous agreement among the delegates.

Committee Reports



On the first day of the summit, the Health Working Group deliberated and discussed several issues of critical importance. Our agenda pertaining to the building of stronger and more reliable healthcare infrastructure, to aid recovery and prevention against pandemics, was discussed by all delegates offering their nation's respective perspectives and prognosis. Delegates talked about various flaws in the global and domestic healthcare systems, such as management, funding and discrimination. They also delved deep into preventing and remediating pandemics, and global health equity, which led the committee to a few common solutions such as tele-medicine, better vaccination, accessibility and affordability of healthcare, and many more. The sessions also witnessed the committee coming together, in an unlikely partnership between USC and Russia for the crisis. mPOX was also declared as a global pandemic, crossing the species-barrier, and being communicable from air, water and livestock.



ENVIRONMENT AND CLIMATE PERSEVERANCE

The delegates were told to discuss and deliberate upon how climate education should be introduced and how it shall be beneficial to the world. The working group came to consensus that there shall be climate education awareness for people who are currently in the industrial workspace, such as factory owners and workers. They also agreed that the younger generation should be educated and told on how they should be treating the environment, by inculcating a subject in different curricula.

ENERGY TRANSITIONS



The first committee session kicked off with each delegate presenting their stance within a tight 3-minute window. This fast-paced format pushed everyone to bring their best ideas to the table, leading to some really innovative solutions. It also helped establish a common goal, setting the stage for building alliances. The delegates came well-prepared, armed with extensive research, which allowed them to identify incentives that could work for their respective countries.

In the second session, the momentum carried forward. Delegates started picking apart the sub-agendas, looking for areas where they could find common ground. This wasn't just about talking; it was about strategically forming alliances that could help them reach a consensus. The focus was on collaboration, and the delegates worked together to push the conversation forward.

By the third session, the alliances that had been formed were put to the test. Delegates used these partnerships to their advantage, driving negotiations and working hard to spot areas where they could all agree. The process was intense, but it showed the power of collaboration. The delegates were committed to seeing their alliances through, using them as a springboard for reaching consensus on the key issues.
